Throughout all sessions, members will strengthen mathematical thinking, spatial intelligence, hand eye co-ordination, fine motor skills, turn taking and problem solving.


Freeplay is also an important theme in our club. The creativity, diversity and imagination of the builds produced by members are exceptional and of a very high standard.

One of the many lessons we had for Science Week involved using the school's magnetism kit, trying out different types of magnets with iron filings.






We had a magical visit from Santa this month. Every pupil got to say hello, take a photo, and get some chocolate from this special guest!



#### Science Week

In Science Week, like other classes we did a variety of experiments to showcase what we learned in our science workbooks. Here are a few examples of some experiments we tried out:

First up, we tried and experiment that showcased the three forms that materials exist in: solid, liquid and gas. You begin by filling two balloons with water and then blowing one up with your breath. You leave one of the two balloons with water in a freezer and once it turns into ice then you are finished and you can feel and see the differences in the three forms.









Next up, is a simple test of how air expands with heat and all you need is one balloon and a radiator which is turned on. Blow the balloon about half full of air and hold it just above the radiator so the air is going right into the balloon. Once you have it there for one or two minutes you will see that the balloon has gotten harder to touch and bigger in size, without blowing and more air in. This is due to molecules spacing out so the heat can pass through.

And finally, another balloon involved test (they seemed to be useful throughout the week) in which you get two fully blown up balloons and some push pins. You first place a pin on a table with the point facing upwards then you get one balloon and push it onto the point Then the balloon instantly pops, but on the other hand, if you place 10-20 pins side by side facing upward again then you will see a different result once you push down on the pins we found that it was much more difficult to pop the balloon. This is due to the spread of pressure of all the pins which cannot single out a point of superior pressure so it is basically like placing it on a table.



Overall, we had great fun with the experiments and I would love to do some of them at home!


